

Chair Report

I am delighted to present the Chair's Annual Report for the Greater Shepparton Foundation, GSF's fifth year of operation. It has been a year filled with progress, resilience, and significant achievements that have reaffirmed our commitment to the development of an even stronger, more inclusive and successful community that looks to remove barriers encountered by people facing disadvantage.

A few key points to reflect on the year have been:

Smooth Transition of Leadership: I would like to thank outgoing Chair Rhys Holloran for his leadership and dedication to our Foundation. I would also like to recognise the inspiring work of Cheryl Hammer as our CEO since the inception of Greater Shepparton Foundation five years ago. Rhys and Cheryl's tenure was marked by dedication and vision, including during the challenge of the lockdown years. In the year that has just been, I have been honoured to continue the position of Chairperson. This has been made all the easier through our committed and passionate team including new and existing board members, wonderful support staff in Kate Smith and Jeff Huddle but particularly through the leadership of our new EO, Amanda McCulloch. Amanda began as EO in our organisation just as flood waters took over our area. We are so fortunate that Amanda was able to understand the landscape of need in our area immediately from her commencement and also that she has been able to work so collaboratively with other community organisations and our council to provide practical and meaningful assistance to so many in our region.

Board Self-Assessment Work: Our dedication to continuous improvement led us to undertake a comprehensive Board Self-Assessment. This process allowed us to reflect on our strengths and identify areas for growth. The insights gained from this assessment have been instrumental in shaping our strategies, ensuring that we remain effective and responsive to the evolving needs of our community.

Flood Recovery Work: The challenges posed by flood waters in our region in October 2022 tested our community's resilience. We were humbled to receive generous support to our flood recovery campaign in the order of \$300,000. These funds have assisted people in crisis situations to keep food on the table, to gain financial advice to assist those affected to rebuild their lives and to rebuild community buildings and organisations that bring

people together. These efforts showcased the power of collective action and reinforced the spirit of unity that defines our community. Of course, flood recovery is far from over and we will continue to look for projects and funding to continue our support of people affected by current and future crisis situations.

Community Health Educators Graduation: One of the highlights of the GSF year was being able to attend and celebrate the graduation of our Community Health Educators program participants. This initiative empowers new Shepparton residents from diverse backgrounds with the essential skills required to become health information leaders for their own community. Witnessing their journey from new residents unfamiliar with the health landscape of their environment to becoming leaders of health information for the community they belong to has been truly inspiring.

As the year comes to an end and we look ahead, we remain committed to our vision of an inclusive, interconnected community where everybody has equal opportunity to participate.

I extend my heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated team, board members, volunteers, supporters, and the entire Greater Shepparton community. Your support fuels our progress and emboldens us to amplify, assist and elevate community driven change.

Executive Officer Report

I am pleased to present the EO Report for the Greater Shepparton Foundation. This year has been a tough and transformative period for our community, who were impacted by the October 2022 floods, however I am incredibly proud of the resilience and self-determination demonstrated during what has been an incredibly challenging time.

The Greater Shepparton Foundation took immediate action to support those affected by the floods. Through our disaster relief efforts, we provided emergency assistance, and resources to organisations to scale up operations and assist those impacted.

We also collaborated with local authorities and community organizations to ensure a coordinated response for longterm recovery efforts. Together our community has shown resilience, compassion, and unity in the face of adversity.

Funds raised through the Community Flood Recovery campaign have supported relief payments, mental health services, financial services, the rebuilding of community facilities, supported sporting club memberships, and the purchase and distribution of mosquito repellent and in-language information, all in an effort to keep our community safe and supported.

GSF were nimble in response to the floods, with many small discretionary grants to empower those in our community who are best placed to look after the most vulnerable.

Our ability to adapt and respond in a timely manner for our community continues to be one of our strengths and as EO I witnessed first-hand the immediate impact our contribution had on our community through organisations like Giz a Break and Point of Difference.

While much of our focus has been on flood recovery efforts, we have also welcomed new partnerships this financial year with Mazda Foundation joining established partners Margaret Attwood Trust and Upotipotpon Foundation to build our flagship Oral Language Intervention Program (OLI).

OLI has continued going from strength to strength over the past year, and the evidence is mounting that this early, targeted intervention is resulting in remarkable improvements in the oral language capabilities of our Foundation students.

This evidence-based program not only empowers young learners but also paves the way for their future academic and personal success. We are so proud of the OLI program, and the wonderful partnerships brokered with Mooroopna Park, Mooroopna and Mooroopna North Primary Schools. We should also mention our wonderful Speech Pathologists Surabhi and Leah who have expertly led a team of fourth year speech pathology students through Melbourne University to support OLI this year.

In the coming year, the Greater Shepparton Foundation will continue to forge partnerships, explore innovative solutions, and champion initiatives that address the evolving needs of our community. Our commitment to creating a sustainable, inclusive, and vibrant Greater Shepparton remains unwavering.

I extend my heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated staff, board members, volunteers, partners, and the Greater Shepparton community for their unwavering support. Together, we are building a stronger foundation for a brighter future.



FOOD AND MATERIAL AID SUPPORT

These donations were promptly distributed to support areas of need following the floods. At the height of the floods, funds supported delivery of food and material aid through flood waters.

Flood Recovery Snapshot

GIZ A BREAK

Giz A Break is an award winning registered health promotion charity that wraps mental and physical health and wellbeing initiatives into an off-road touring format.

Donations from the Community Flood Recovery campaign supported Giz A Break to use their 4WD vehicles to distribute medication and food supplies through flood waters to isolated community members.

Donations also supported young people impacted by the floods and living in temporary accommodation to attend Giz A Break camps.



Donations to the Greater Shepparton Flood Recovery Campaign supported a collaboration between Shepparton Foodshare, Mooroopna Education and Activity Centre (MEAC) and Life Op Shop following the floods.

Life Op Shop, run by the Life Church, was inundated during the floods. A central connection point for many vulnerable people in the Mooroopna community, the closure of Life Op Shop presented a real concern that access to food relief in Mooroopna would be scarce following the floods.

Greater Shepparton Foundation, Foodshare and MEAC met with Life Op Shop to discuss options and find solutions for the Mooroopna community, while the Life Church focusses on restoring and rebuilding its own Church in Treacy Street, which was also damaged by the floods.

A partnership was established, to see MEAC a registered agency of Shepparton Foodshare, extend their food relief service to support the Mooroopna community throughout 2023.

Flood Recovery

GREATER SHEPPARTON FOUNDATION'S COMMUNITY FLOOD RECOVERY CAMPAIGN RAISED \$300,000 TO SUPPORT THE MEDIUM TO LONG-TERM RECOVERY NEEDS OF THE GREATER SHEPPARTON COMMUNITY.

Established to support the place-based recovery efforts, and with our ability to be nimble in our response to immediate needs of the community, support was available to organisations including Giz A Break to deliver food and material aid through flood waters and to provide free camps to young people displaced by the floods; Point of Difference Studio to support the immediate response efforts to assist the multicultural community; and Shepparton Family and Financial Services to scale up their operations and put on an additional Financial Counsellor to support families navigate the flood assessment process and access emergency payments.

A Flood Recovery Grant Round was established to equitably and transparently distribute funds raised through the Community Flood Recovery Campaign to areas of need not funded elsewhere, and funds established a new Horses for Hope program to provide equine therapy to young people struggling with the aftermath of the floods, Mooroopna Education and Activity Centre to financially support flood impacted households with relief payments, the Mooroopna Halls with funds to repair and re-establish the much loved community facility, and Edi Celebrations at Africa House.





MOSQUITO PREVENTION PROGRAM

Greater Shepparton Foundation's Mosquito-Borne Disease Intervention Prevention program formed an important part of our community flood recovery efforts.

This program saw every child attending local kindergartens in 2023 having access to free insect repellent, and in-language information to ensure more families in our community are informed and safe from mosquito-borne diseases and their life-long impacts.

This program was delivered with the support of Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal, Pratt Foundation, Greater Shepparton City Council and Wise Well Women.

WINTER WARMTH PROGRAM

The Rotary Club of South Shepparton in partnership with Greater Shepparton Foundation delivered the Winter Warmth Program over the cooler months, distributing 140 blankets, 15 heaters and 33 hot water bottles to those living in caravans or displaced from their homes, or struggling financially as a result of the floods.

Through their Winter Warmth Program, they are ensuring that those affected have the necessary warmth and comfort during these difficult times.

GIVIT TOGETHER NATIONAL CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

Our GIVIT Together National Christmas campaign, designed to support flood impacted families with vouchers, delivered over 300 fuel, grocery and toy vouchers to 146 children, across 53 families and five schools.

In excess of \$8,000 in vouchers were generously donated through the GIVIT platform and distributed through flood impacted Primary School households.

OZCHILD CHRISTMAS HAMPERS

Greater Shepparton Foundation partnered with McColl's Transport and Athlete's Foot Shepparton to support the 2022 OzChild SafeCare program.

OzChild is focussed on providing support for children and young people in foster and kinship care and keeping families together where possible. The campaign provides Christmas hampers for families participating in the family preservation program and recognises the challenges faced by families this year with many families impacted by the floods.

Greater Shepparton Foundation also financially supported with funds raised through the Community Flood Recovery Campaign.

Delivered with the support of McColl's Transport and Athletes Foot Shepparton.

SPORTING CHANCE

A partnership between Greater Shepparton City Council, FamilyCARE and Greater Shepparton Foundation, we supported in excess of 300 flood impacted individuals to reengage with sporting clubs, dance associations and soccer clubs.

The benefits of engagement in sport and recreation are insurmountable. The floods, coupled with the cost-of-living crisis, saw a downturn in engagement with local clubs. Through this partnership we were able to reach out to flood impacted households and support their ongoing engagement with activities to support their mental health.

MAJOR PROJECTS

Little Learners

The groundbreaking Little Learners program has celebrated another successful year supporting and building confidence in families from culturally and linguistically diverse (CaLD) backgrounds to engage with early start to kinder from three years old.

DURING THE 2022 YEAR A TOTAL OF 535 HOURS OF BILINGUAL SUPPORT WAS PROVIDED TO THE 23 CHILDREN ENGAGED IN THE LITTLE LEARNERS PROGRAM AND THEIR PARENTS/CARERS.

Children from a refugee and asylum seeker background have often experienced significant displacement and trauma impacting on their early development.

Extensive research and evidence indicates early engagement of vulnerable children in early childhood education services has a substantial impact on a child's cognitive, emotional and social development, yet the concept of leaving a child at kindergarten is a foreign to many Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CaLD) families.

Little Learners is about building trust with CaLD families, they see a familiar face and build the confidence to communicate with educators about their children's needs, while the children are getting vital support and growth opportunities to adequately prepare them for school.



The results are impressive -

OUTCOME 1

Parent's felt supported through the enrolment process.

THE INTRODUCTION OF BILINGUAL SUPPORTED FACE-TO-FACE ENROLMENT SESSIONS IN 2022 DOUBLED PARENTS' CONFIDENCE WITH KINDERGARTEN ENROLMENT AND ORIENTATION PROCESSES.

"I was absolutely gobsmacked at the success rate of families turning up for their appointments. I could not believe it! I have experience booking translators for families for hospital appointments and was used to having a 40% hit rate of families turning up. I was amazed that, overtime, every family booked for an enrolment support session, aside from the one who was overseas, turned up... Having bilingual workers involved in the enrolment process is absolutely essential to the engagement of non-English speaking families and cannot be overstated. Without their input, half the children enrolled would not have ended up attending kinder at all.' Greater Shepparton City Council staff member involved with enrolment process. [GSC employee].




Little Learners

OUTCOME 2

CaLD parents feel comfortable communicating with kinder teachers about their child's development with the support of bilingual workers.

2022 PARENTS' COMFORT LEVEL IN COMMUNICATING WITH TEACHERS ABOUT THEIR CHILD'S DEVELOPMENT



"I really appreciate the support of the bilingual worker because she helped me and my child to feel confident, happy, and safe at kinder with educators and other children. For my son, we feel love, supported and belonging to a family...' [Parent]

OUTCOME 3

CaLD parents build relationships with other parents, breaking down cultural barriers and bonding over their children's shared experiences at Kinder.

PARENTS' PEER RELATIONSHIPS STRENGTHENED WITH 100% OF PARENTS AT THE END OF THE YEAR INDICATING THEY WERE 'GOOD AT BUILDING A HEALTHY RELATIONSHIP AND COMMUNICATING WITH OTHERS' IN KINDERGARTEN.

"My daughter made a lot of progress in so many ways. She has got many friends in kinder, socializes, participating in different activities. She never used to talk in English prior going to kinder but now she speaks English at home and kinder. Now she talks about her days to me and her siblings which is beautiful. It makes me very happy to hear my daughter communicating in English language." [Parent]

OUTCOME 4

CaLD children are more emotionally and developmentally ready to start 5 year old Kinder by the end of the year.

"...My daughter was isolated and did not know the concept of sharing and playing with other children and so on. After attending 3-year-old kinder, she started speaking English very well, became social and happy...she is now outspoken, able to express her feelings in English, no longer withdrawn. Kinder helped her to be self-confident." [Parent]



Little Learners

This program provides bilingual support to reduce language, social and cultural barriers to education. By providing culturally sensitive language support to parents and children, we aim to enhance CaLD children's experience and development in early education.

The bilingual support workers serve as a critical bridge to improving communication between the child and the educators; the educators and the families; and between non-English speaking and English-speaking children.

"I would like to request my daughter be able to have more days per week to attend kinder. I think she needs more time to be well-prepared for school. I wish she had more time to grow and learn and have experiences to help her to have a better future. It would be beneficial for her, and for me, because she could teach me what she has been learning as well." [Parent]



OUR PARTNERS

Place-based programs like Little Learners align with our vision of "inclusive, interconnected communities where everybody has equal opportunity to participate". Our project partnerships with UnitingCare Goulburn North East and Greater Shepparton City Council are critical in delivering an inclusive and culturally appropriate response to the needs of CaLD children and families.

This program is made possible by multi-year grants from the Ross Trust and the Besen Family Foundation. GSF has a dedicated Evaluation and Data Manager and supports this innovative place-based early years education program through ongoing monitoring, evaluation and reporting back to our community, partners and funders.

OLI - Oral Language Intervention




The award-winning Oral Language Intervention (OLI) program has been recognized as a significant place-based intervention, positively impacting participating children's early years development and delivering outstanding results.

In its fourth year in three Mooroopna public primary schools and two early education centres, OLI is supporting students' oral language and literacy progress by providing intensive, evidence-based assessment and interventions from the foundation years. This early intervention improves students' language and literacy skills, leading to more effective learning and engagement.

The program is a fabulous partnership between the participating schools and early years education centres, the University of Melbourne's Department of Rural Health overseeing the placement of the program's' speech pathology fourth year students and our two Speech Pathologists guiding and supporting the delivery of the program including upskilling of education staff and placement students.

Using a multi-tiered system of support, the program offers a universal screening assessment and interventions for all students (Tier 1), while also supporting teachers to adopt best practice in oral language, reading and spelling in the classroom. Tier 2 provides targeted group intervention for students, requiring support to 'catch up' their oral language skills, and Tier 3 offers one-on-one intensive support for those students at risk of really falling significantly behind their peers.

OLI - Oral Language Intervention



Congratulations to Mooroopna Park Primary School, on it's integrated wellbeing program, which includes the Oral Language Intervention program, recognized with an excellence award at the Australian Education Awards in 2023.

This follows the program winning the Australian Education Pivot Best Student Wellbeing Award and the Victorian Early Years Promoting Children's Health and Wellbeing Award in 2022.

We know early intervention in oral language development is key to changing educational outcomes of students, improving their readiness for learning and to take advantage of the opportunities education will afford them.

CASE EXAMPLE

Owen* (Foundation Year)

"Owen is one of the younger Foundation students, turning five in Term 1.

He commenced school with limited interest in reading and writing. Owen is unable to practice his literacy skills regularly at home therefore he relies on teaching and intervention at school to improve his skills. With his knowledge of sounds through the Little Learners Love Literacy Program his confidence has increased throughout the year, he is now willing to attempt writing tasks and his reading has progressed significantly in the second half of the year. To see Owen's confidence in his own abilities and pride in his written work as well as his reading progress has been an exciting aspect of my role."

EVALUATION IN 2022 SHOWED FOUNDATION STUDENTS WHO RECEIVED OLI SUPPORT WERE GENERALLY OUTSCORING, USING LANGUAGE METRICS, GRADE 1/2 STUDENTS WHO HAD NOT RECEIVED OLI SUPPORT IN THEIR FIRST YEAR OF EDUCATION.



OUR PARTNERS

We thank our valued partner funders, the Upotipotpon Foundation, Margaret Attwood Trust and our newest partner Mazda Foundation for their continued support as we embark on another year of improving oral language and reducing vulnerability across our schools and early education centres.

Community Health Educators



The Community Health Educator's (CHE) program has been lauded by professional services as a valuable place-based response to improving access by non-English speaking communities to our western medical services and health agencies.

Following a successful pilot in April 2021, where 12 women from eight ethnic backgrounds participated in training as Community Health Educators to build the health literacy capacity of refugee and migrant women in Greater Shepparton, under the guidance of Wise Well Women, the program has expanded.

In 2023, thirteen migrant women from eight different nationalities, many multilingual (62%) participated in training covering topics including education, mental health, legal and financial services and trauma informed training.

"I have improved my knowledge about many important things and how to support those who are suffering with mental health problems or family violence... I learned how to connect people to helping services".

OUR PARTNERS

This program is supported by Upotipotpon Foundation and lovingly delivered by Wise Well Women.

Many refugees have suffered trauma, conflict, family separation and significant human rights violations, including torture and physical and sexual violence. Settling in

Australia can also trigger multiple stressors such as: navigating life in a new country, language barriers, housing and financial instability, difficulty accessing employment, changes in family roles, visa status, and loss of community, country and cultural connections.

"...As a woman in my country I didn't have the chance to learn, to study, to work, which was my dream. And when I got here, I had the opportunity... When I'm supporting the community, when I'm encouraging them to come to sessions [health literacy] to come out and have some fun and get information, I feel like, 'over the moon.'

GSF believes this health program is ground-breaking in bridging the gap in our region between our first world health services and refugee and new arrival communities who face multiple barriers to accessing the services.



Shepparton Family & Financial Services

Greater Shepparton Foundation supported the employment and training of a Financial Capability worker and Financial Counsellor at Shepparton Family and Financial Services (SFFS).

SFFS has seen significant growth, with the non-for-profit service becoming a 'catch all' when it reopened its doors immediately following the floods and new clients presented seeking financial services, emergency food aid and no-interest loans.

Presentations at this scale are more than double the normal number of clients seeking support, and it was essential GSF step in to support staff, volunteers and ensure adequate resources were in place so those seeking support were not turned away.

While the services of a Financial Counsellor were in-train before the floods, our ability to scale up our level of support for this important service proved vital in supporting those seeking financial support.

As well as supporting with funds from the Community Flood Recovery Campaign, Greater Shepparton Foundation has been lobbying the Victorian Government to recognise and support grassroots organisations, such as SFFS, that have stepped up during the flood crisis.

Minister for Government Services Danny Pearson and Minister for Housing and Cultural Affairs Colin Brooks took time to visit SFFS in November 2022 to gain a greater understanding of the important work SFFS does in supporting the Greater Shepparton community.

AT A GLANCE

- 195 clients supported by Financial Capability worker through SFFS
- The main areas of concern were utility debts (28%) No-interest loans (26%) credit card or Afterpay debt (14%) relocation costs (12%) and replacing damaged, destroyed or lost items in the floods (10%) fines (4%) telephone or internet debt (3%) and rental arrears or eviction (2%)

CASE STUDY

50-year-old male living alone on a property in his own caravan, which he lost in the floods.

He had been couch-surfing and suffers mental health issues and is in recovery.

With no insurance he engaged with Shepparton Family and Financial Services Financial Counsellor to assist with support for non-insured property, as his initial assessment was denied because the forms were not filled in correctly.

He has several debts outstanding a credit card, personal loan, ATO debt, sip money, cash converters and money 3 loans. The Financial Counsellor was able to secure a part waiver on credit card and monthly repayments of \$50 with no interest or fees attached until outstanding debt is paid in full. Client has been referred to mental support services.





Lift Off Education Scholarships

We believe inspiring students to achieve their dreams through higher education is one of the most satisfying ways we can support our young people, and in the long term our community.

Our Lift Off Education Scholarship Program will turn 10 years old in 2024, and in that time, it has supported 120 students from the Goulburn Valley to achieve their aspirational further education dreams with more than \$500,000 in scholarships distributed

The Lift Off Education Scholarship Program is having a lifechanging impact on young people, financially supporting them with relocation costs, university fees, rent, school materials and providing a safety net between jobs.

Lift Off was established in 2014 as a response to the increasing number of our young people not able to afford the transition from secondary education to post-secondary education. A study has shown that young people from nonmetropolitan regions in Victoria defer university studies at twice the rate of their metropolitan counterparts, and currently only half of our young people finish secondary school and a quarter go on to tertiary education.

Each year a volunteer advisory committee works with GSF to oversee the program and to make sure it is delivering on our goal of equal opportunity for everyone to participate in their chosen course in life. We thank the committee lead by Mary-ann Linehan and value our partnership with the Greater Shepparton Lighthouse Project.
